Explanation of Waiver for Abandonment

After thorough consideration of both safety and logistical factors, we have determined that abandonment in place is a more feasible and safer option compared to removal. The tank is currently located in the Hospital basement, encased within concrete walls and a concrete lid. Additionally, it is situated within a critical mechanical room surrounded by essential hospital utilities, including HVAC systems, electrical lines, fire alarms and suppression, and other infrastructure that support hospital operations. Removing the tank would require disturbing these systems, posing a risk of damage to critical hospital utilities, which could lead to service disruptions, and potentially compromise patient care. The tank can be properly cleaned, purged of any remaining contents, and sealed to prevent any future hazards. Since the tank is already contained within concrete and isolated from active hospital areas, it poses minimal risk to the building or its occupants.
